Mitch and Ryan came running back onstage to introduce the headlining act for the evening, returning favourites Justice Crew, who kicked off the first party of the

AJ2016.

The party rocked on into the night, until we had to recognise that all good things must come to an end and that the opening ceremony had to close after Justice Crew's last song or our Scouts would never get to sleep! And so, in order to ensure that everyone wakes up bright and early for the start of activities, Ryan and Mitch returned to the stage one last time to dismiss the crowd and end the opening celebrations.

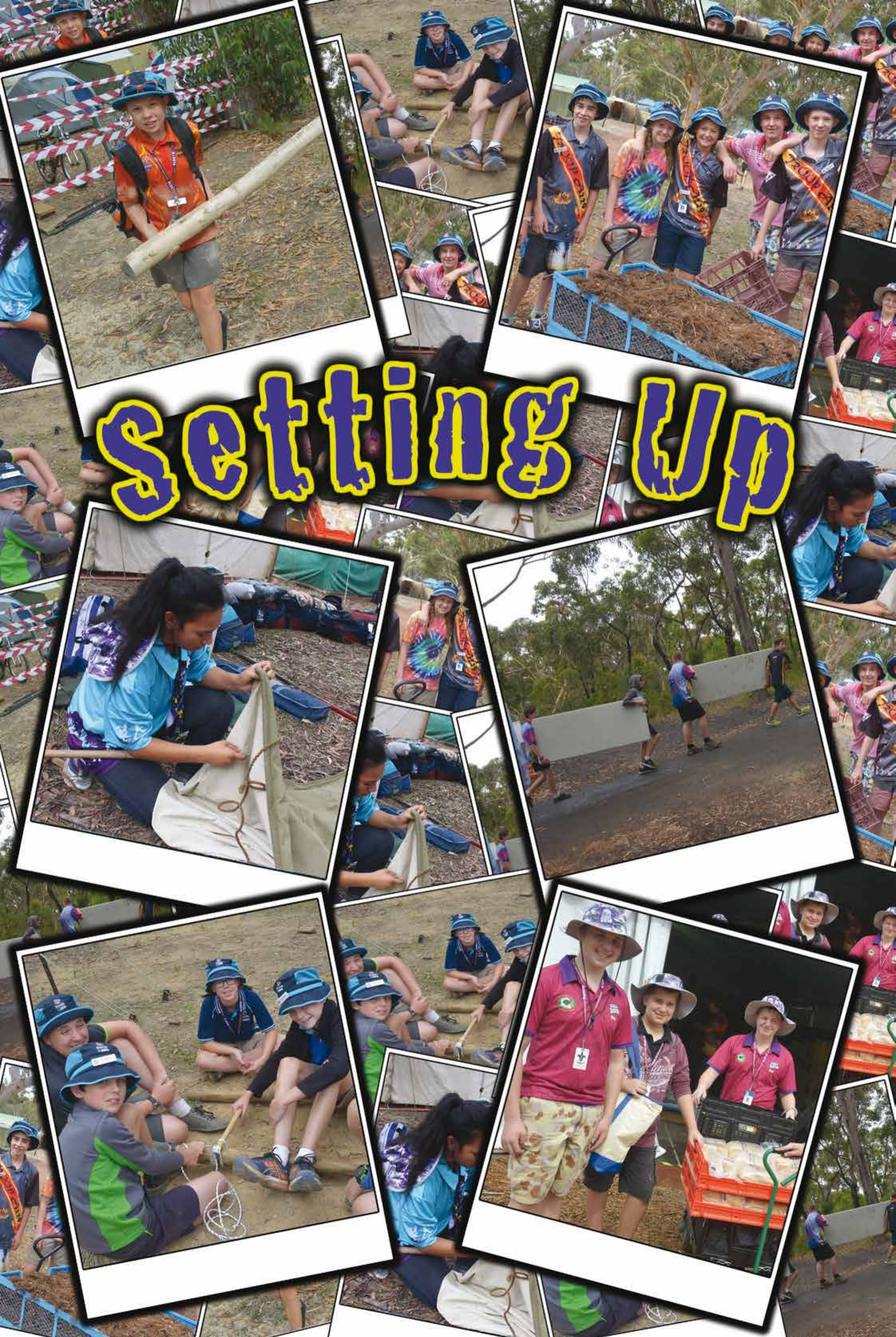

Jamboree Award

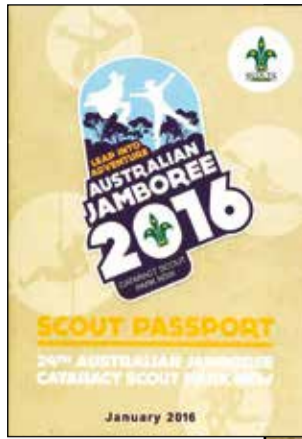

To receive the Jamboree Award you will need to do the following:

2. Go International, chill at theCrate and perform in front of the camera at JNN TV
3. Spend your free time Mashing it Up, Going Colonial or surfing the air waves.
4. Pop in to your own State HQ and see what it's like interstate.
5. Challenge another troop to a water fight, cricket match or meal swap.

Check out your passbook for more information and ideas. Don't limit yourself with the free time activities, leap into the Jamboree experience and do as many as you like.

What's On Site?

Telstra Payphones

For all of those who have promised their parents a phone call during the Jamboree, Telstra Payphones are available in the Mall off Crabtree Drive. There are six payphones for homesick Scouts to send 20c texts, and 50c calls within Australia. Reverse charges can be made on both Telstra and the nearby PhoneAway phones.



Internet Café

Located in the western corner of the mall, beside the NSW Contingent HQ, the Internet Café is available to all Scouts, Venturers, and Leaders. To soothe your internet withdrawal symptoms, the first hour of internet (including WiFi) is free. Every consecutive hour is an additional \$5. The café closes at 9:00pm for Scouts.

ATMs

Short of money for a snow cone (or perhaps a large cappuccino for the Leaders)? You can withdraw money from the ATMs in front of the Internet Café, free of charge. (Thanks, Westpac!)

Stores

You can't miss the bright blue stores surrounding the mini arena, between the stage and JNNFM. Home to a variety of food and merchandise, here you can pick up a Jamboree polo, a packet of chips and ice creams to enjoy with friends (or to treat yourself!).

Drink Stalls

Have you spotted a Scout sipping on a Boost Juice and been craving one? Wander down to the Mini Arena to find the drink stalls on the opposite side to JNNFM. Snow cones can be purchased here for \$5, and a medium smoothie or crush from Boost will cost you \$7. Craving caffeine? Coffee is also available.

St John Ambulance at Cataract

St John Ambulance Australia is onsite to attend to all your first aid and emergency needs. Recently the Commissioner of St John Ambulance Australia (NSW), Mr Didier Moutia, visited his volunteers at Cataract Park. Mr Moutia is a nurse and has been a dedicated volunteer with St John for 30 years and State Commissioner for the last two. While he hasn't attended a Jamboree before, he has attended previous Cuborees at Cataract and Camp Couatts.

St John is a sponsor of the 2016 Australian Jamboree, providing 24 hour medical support to everyone here at Jamboree. There are six to eight volunteers on site during the day, as well as members on site and on call overnight. The volunteers are prepared for every potential scenario from minor injuries to resuscitation, but their main role is to provide primary care, like checking wounds. Mr Moutia believes the greatest challenge for St John Volunteers will be the terrain and size of AJ2016 as well as the nature of the adventurous activities.

Mr Moutier says St John are "happy to support worthwhile organisations like Scouts" because he believes Scouts is an organisation that provides quality care for their members and have a genuine interest in their welfare. The Chief Commissioner of Scouts Australia, Mr Chris "Chiefy" Bates, said he was happy St John was here, but with all luck we won't need their services.

Further down the road (4,500 kilometres down the road, in fact), Ben, Dan, Vincent, and their Leader Andrew (Troop A112) seemed pretty envious of a one-hour commute to Cataract. Their hike started in the town of Broome, one of the furthest locations from our campsite. Thanks to some clever Maths and skilful memories, they were able to figure out that their journey had taken them 15 hours. That's a lot of books to read!

But if it is a contest of distance, then the victors are surely the lovely patrol from 2nd Templecombe, in Somerset, United Kingdom. You can find them in Troop D705 and hear all about how they covered the 17,000 kilometres between here and home. If you're struggling to picture how long 17,000 kilometres is, imagine laying every single blood vessel in your body end-to-end. Don't actually do this, because the Medical Centre isn't equipped to reassemble curious campers!

The Australiana Village Gazette

January 4, 1816

All of the citizens of Australiana Village, in the Parish of Cataract, join the whole populace of the Colony of New South Wales, to rejoice and celebrate the sudden swell in the population, most of whom seemed to have arrived in the last two days. Many of them have already erected temporary shelters and tents to provide for their comfort and succour.

Many of these new settlers are young convicts and their adult overseers, who should look on their stay with us as a time for hard work and temperance. Adolescent convicts will be relieved to know that laws preventing Child Slavery have now been enacted, which restrict your daily work to just 16 hours a day. Overseers, please take note!

This influx of settlers will be a huge strain on the Village's administration. For this reason, we are very thankful to his Excellency, Governor Macquarie, for assigning a squad of soldiers from the 73rd Regiment of Foot and their presence will do much to ensure that the law-abiding citizens of the parish feel safe and protected, while their morning and afternoon parades will be a colourful spectacle each day in the Village.

To cope with the anticipated increase in unseemly behaviour associated with our newly expanded population, the judicial officials have proposed holding a series of court sessions at 9.10 am and 2.10 pm daily. Temperate and law-abiding citizens are encouraged to arrest and bring to trial

any transgressors that violate public decency. The arresting citizens will be compensated with a handsome and valuable reward.



Court Notices: Forthcoming Sessions Special Court Session For January 5, 1816

Residents of the Parish of Cataract are advised that the first of these scheduled trials, where citizens can arrest suspects, will be on January 5, 1810 and will be directed towards anyone accused of Disturbing the Peace Violations.

Convicts (Scouts) or Overseers

(Leaders) who have previously notified the Clerk of the Court, can bring the arrested scoundrel to the Court House at Australiana Village at 9.10 am or 2.10 pm on this said afternoon.

Disturbing the Peace could include such offences as snoring, curfew violations and other forms of wild or wilfully excessive and riotous behaviour etc.

Special Court Session for January 6, 1816

Residents of the Parish of Cataract are notified that the Special Court Sessions for the January 6, 1810 will provide the opportunity to arrest and bring to trial, anyone accused of the crime of Mental Torture, which could include repeatedly telling lame jokes, and other forms of similarly irritating

behaviour.

Notification of transgressions for either of these Special Court Sessions needs to be supplied to the Clerk of the Court at the Australiana Village Court House, preferably the day before the court session.

Arrestees should be prepared to conduct their own brief case for the prosecution and present their evidence to His Worship, Judge Percy Fontleroy or the presiding magistrate, so that a judgement can be delivered. Those found guilty will be harshly punished!

If the case is proven, the arresting citizens will be compensated with a valuable reward.

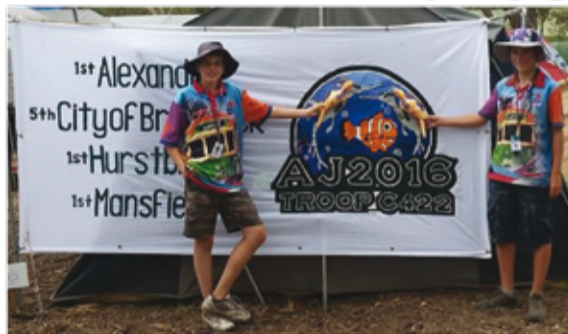

With the Queensland Contingent Headquarters officially open to everyone tomorrow it was still a popular location.

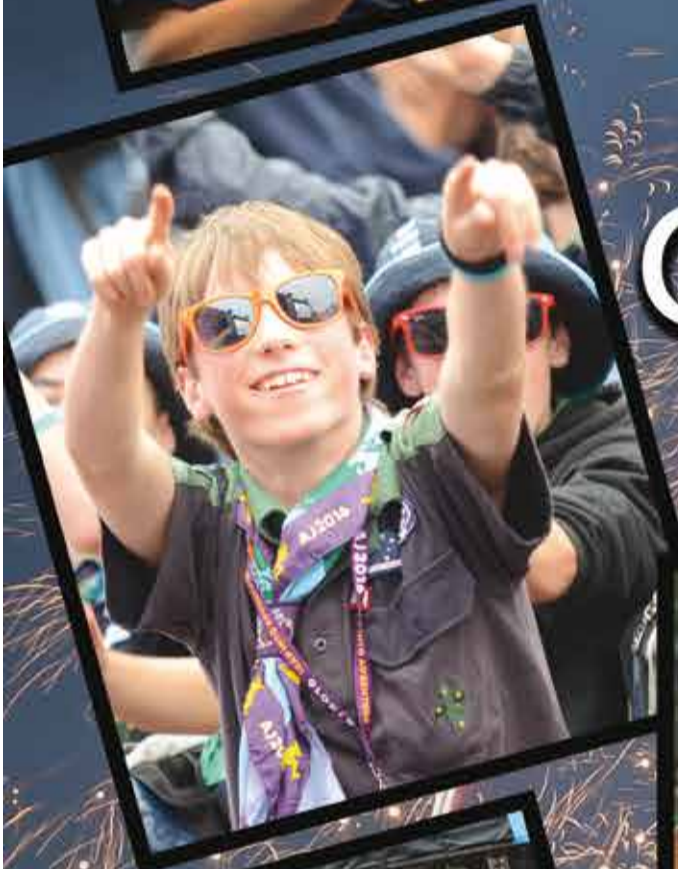
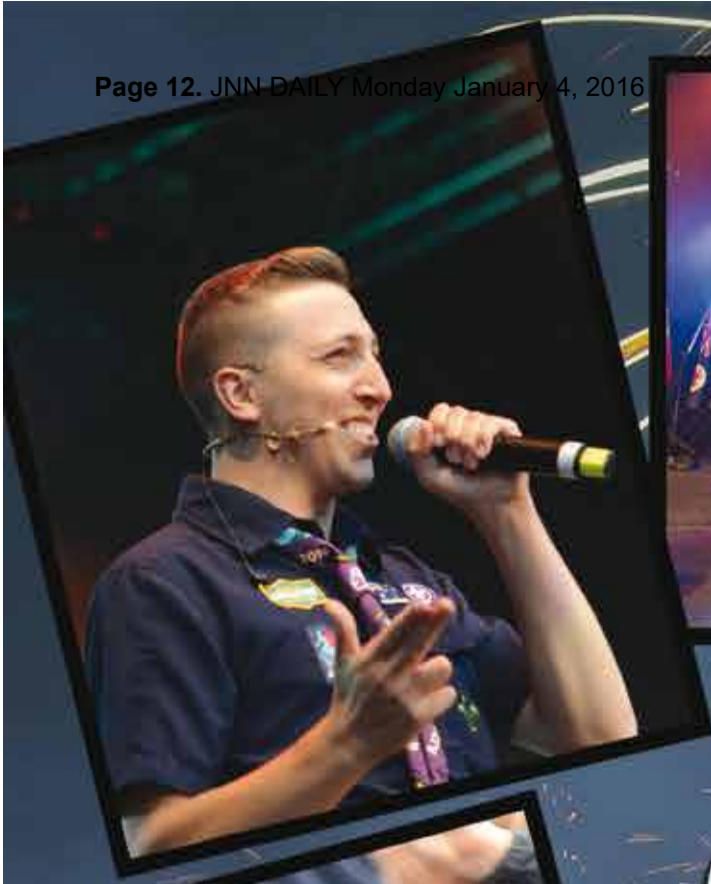
Many of the Scouts spent the day enjoying the Market with music, food and new friends. Others wandered down to the Shed for some old fashion craft such as candle making.
