Fun in the Sun at Botany Bay

"Will we get wet?" asked the Scout. "Not if you're fast enough," said the Water Activities Leader.

A day out at Bonna Point Reserve, Kurnell will have you wet, sandy and smiling from ear to ear.

When you arrive, you get to snaffle another arm band, (no choices in getting a colour to suit your eyes though) and you collect your own flag bearer for the day (but you have to give them back). Dump your bags in the set up shelters and check in for your first activity.

They have slides, dunk tanks, snorkelling, canoeing and kayaking, two blow up obstacle courses, geocaching, and swimming. The tide will determine how much effort your patrol will have to put in to get you up and over the obstacle course. When JNN Daily visited the site, the general comment from Scouts was "ahhh!", their comments being as eloquent as their landing off the slide. James 'The Colonel' Lutwyche encouraged the Scouts by yelling out "C'mon, Hurry up!" as he bounced through obstacle course one.

"The aim of the day is to keep them busy and wet the whole time", said Water Activity Leader, Ian Hale. Most activities are completed in Patrols for the day, which encourages leadership, problem solving, and initiative, but most of all, fun!

There are 100 canoes and kayaks in Quibray Bay to build your basic skills in paddling and capsizing! The experienced paddlers can head over to the sandy beach and back which is about one kilometre. Andrew Hall said that "the Scouts

have been following instructions well. They get the gist of paddling and just get to give it a go." Duncan Christensen and Bradley Tennyenhuis from C407 said they had got out into the middle, but the wind was pushing a bit. No need to worry though, Selkie in the Zodiac will be there to set you right.

When snorkelling or geocaching, you can rotate through the Mammoth Mountain Drop and the Dunk Tank. "The dunk tank is so much fun! I've been on it three times!" chattered Lucy from C525. "You don't expect it, you go like ah!" echoed another Scout, bubbling with energy. Those who have supplied the awesome inflatables have been quick to take care of any fixes and repairs needed to ensure the fun just keeps on going.

You will have the opportunity to dry out a bit while you trek around the park geocaching. You will start with a quick lesson on how to operate the GPS unit. Patrols then take off in all different directions to locate 15 letters which spell out an important historical question about the local area. We were lucky to chat to Jamboree's own Kung Fu Master (no, not watermelon!) about the activity. Catherine Cheung said that it was a great introduction to geocaching as many Scouts have never used a GPS unit before.

Many Scouts have commented that it has been their favourite activity of the Jamboree so far. No wonder when you have an awesome fun team running the activity who always put the Scouts' safety first. The whole activity has been possible due to the assistance of Ardill Payne and Partners from Ballina, and the Water Activities team who all deserve a huge SPLASH!

John White Medal

The Major General John Payne AO RFD, National President of Scouts Australia, presented the Surgeon General John White Medal to Dr. Allan Kirkpatrick, Director of Health Services AJ2016.

John White arrived with the First Fleet and was the first doctor to practice in Australia. He was the founder of public health in the Nation. The medal is presented by the Surgeon Generals of Australia for service to health in its many forms.

Allan attended his first Jamboree as a Scout at Jindalee in 1968. AJ2016 is Allan's sixth Jamboree as a Leader and second Jamboree as Health Services Director, having performed the same role at AJ2010. The award recognizes Allan's contribution in providing health services to Scouts over the past fifteen years. Allan is very proud and humbled to receive this prestigious award.



The John White Medal has only been awarded 18 times since its inception. This is the second award of the John White Medal at AJ2016. Earlier, at a gathering of the International Contingents, Neville Tomkins, the International Commissioner, was awarded the medal in recognition of his service to International Scouting. This award was also presented by Major General John Payne who said that in Mr Tomkins' six year term he has allowed for "unprecedented outreach from Scouts Australia to more than 20 overseas countries, 14 of which are at AJ2016."



Big bang Theory - Jamboree Style

The firing of the cannon has become a traditional part of Australiana Village, opening the morning and afternoon sessions each day. On Future Scout Day, the cannon was fired eight times for the amusement and entertainment of the huge crowds of visitors.



The village is fortunate to have once again secured the services of theatrical pyrotechnician, Greg Taylor, who has been responsible for ensuring the village sessions get off to a bang.

Greg did the same job for AJ2010 and the 2011 Cuboree and is a much valued member of the village team. He started working at Sydney Opera House in 1975 in capacities ranging from Lighting Technician, Production Manager, Lighting Designer and Pyrotechnician. He has been involved with

many country and national tours with the late Slim Dusty, has been Lighting Designer for nine Australasian Country Music Awards in Tamworth and has taught at NIDA (National Institute of Dramatic Art). Currently does Lighting Design for many community theatre companies, as well as working at the Sydney Opera House.

The cannon was hired from the Strathfield Mens' Shed in Sydney – the gun carriage was made by former Australiana Village blacksmith, Ken Lumsden, with the help of some of the other enthusiastic volunteers.





The Lord Baden-Powell Society

The VIP function tent hosted a thank you function for members of The Lord Baden-Powell Society on Sunday afternoon.

The aim of The Lord Baden-Powell Society is to provide financial assistance to help disadvantaged young Australians experience the benefits of Scouting. They raise money by donations from members to distribute to Branches and via the Jamboree Appeal to send Scouts to national and international events.

This year they raised \$184,000 as part of the Jamboree Appeal and provided assistance to 239 Scouts to enable them to come to Jamboree.

Welcoming guests, David Jones, Chairman of The Lord-Baden Powell Society, repeated the famous words "I have a dream." His dream is to look for new ways to raise and distribute funds to help more youth. To do that, the society needs more members. Anyone can be a member of the Lord Baden-Powell Society. There are different levels of membership depending on the financial commitment the member wishes to make.

In his thank you speech, Chief Commissioner of Australia, Chris Bates commented, "Your generosity enables people to come along." He added, "This organisation offers enormous opportunities... We are proud of our history but need to engage the community. Scouts offers something not offered anywhere else." Indicating to the Scouts at the function, he concluded "Your support has brought the future here."

After his speech, he handed over the microphone to two Scouts, Malcolm Roberts from Nar Nar Goon, Victoria (A102) and Alison Dwyer from Bairnsdale, Victoria (D736). Both received financial assistance from the Society to attend Jamboree. They spoke of how they're enjoying Jamboree and what they are getting out of the experience. Alison commented that her "skills as a Patrol Leader have grown. It's a memory that won't be forgotten."

During the function, National President Major-General John Pearn spoke about his experience at previous Jamborees. "The elements are the same – sleeping under canvas and getting wet!" At this Jamboree, he was excited to have experienced blacksmithing.

Alan Douglas, who this year donated a large amount of shares to the fund, showed off his camp shirt with badges. His original shirt was lost in bush fires so he has had to start a new one. He attended his first Jamboree in 1946 at Loftus. In those days, Jamborees started on Boxing Day and encompassed a larger age

group. Patrol Leaders used to be 17, and Troops did more adventurous activities and competition camps.

Michael Baden-Powell, grandson of Lord Robert Baden-Powell and Scouts Victoria's State Commissioner for Special Duties, said he gets "politely mobbed" everywhere he goes. However he said it was worthwhile if it helped just one person make a difference to their life through Scouting.

He is passionate about projects to help with Scouting. One project he mentioned



was a film on Scouting, originally set to be made by famous director Cecil B. de Mille before his death in 1959. Michael was approached after the 2007 World Jamboree by a film producer wanting to resurrect the project. As he explained, it's the story of a "famous person who turned his back on the military to start the world's greatest peace movement."

We thank all members of The Lord Baden-Powell Society for their valuable support. Scouts are encouraged to apply for grants through their branches.

Top Honours on Site

"The Australian Scout Medallion is the top award in Scouting that only 1-2% of Scouts achieve. It requires the Scout to plan, manage and run a leadership project. It is learning that they can take forward with them forever," said Randall Jones, NSW State Commissioner for Scouts. A number of awards have been presented at the Jamboree, witnessed by proud Leaders and Patrols from all over the country.



The Australian Scout Medallion requires a Scout to demonstrate leadership, attend a leadership course and achievement of the Adventure chord. An extremely prestigious award, it requires dedication from the Scout, parents and Leaders. Daniella Gullotta from 2nd Griffith Scout Group was awarded her ASM at the Jamboree. She organised and ran a 30km hike at Darlington Point along the Murrumbidgee River, as well as assisting fellow Scouts at Pioneer and Explorer level to receive her award.

There are a number of awards being presented here at the Jamboree, including a number of Green Cords. Cameron from 1st Hawkesbury began working on his Green Cord at the beginning of 2015, and was awarded it here at the Jamboree. His dad and Scout Leader, Tim West (Wombat), said Cameron proved himself as a responsible leader during his hike, choosing to put the safety of his Patrol before following his original route. "It's all about teaching," said Wombat, emphasising a key focus of the Scouting award scheme.

Congratulations to all of those presented with their Australian Scout Medallions and various other awards here at the Jamboree. It is an achievement to be incredibly proud of.
