Urban Search and Rescue Visit

In times of major disaster such as flood, fire, tsunami, cyclone or earthquake, the United Nations can request the assistance of accredited Urban Search and Rescue Task Force teams across the world. Australia has two of these teams, one based in Sydney and one in Queensland. They also deal with more local disasters, such as the recent Hunter Valley floods and the severe weather event in Kurnell.

Several of the Sydney-based team called in to have a look around Jamboree on Tuesday. When the team are dropped into the field to help with a disaster, they have to be entirely self-sufficient for two weeks. They're hoping to learn from the way Scouts run their camps, in terms of self-sufficiency and camp hygiene.

Station Officer Tony Waller – also known as Troop Leader of C524 – hosted Station Officer Russell Turner, Senior Firefighter Richard Wilson and Senior Firefighter John Stokes on their trip around site. All three visitors have been Scouts, so are already familiar with how great our organisation is!

The teams in Australia are on-call for three months at a time, and if requested to help, have to be in the air with all their gear in six hours. Team members are from different agencies – as well as the Fire and Rescue NSW people, there are members from NSW Police, SES, Ambulance and many more. They have recently worked in areas such as Vanuatu, Christchurch, Japan, and Los Angeles. The earlier they're able to get into the air, the more lives can be saved.

They toured various Troops to learn how we handle hygiene issues, like food preparation, hand washing, clothes washing, and the equipment we use, such as dining flies and hot water systems. They hope to borrow Scouts' ideas, make them their own and then pass those back to Scouts.

Behind the Scenes at JNNFM

The backing track to AJ2016 is the perpetual broadcast of JNNFM. From the Top 9 @ 9 to the Dance Parties of an evening, to late night Taylor Swift playlists, Jamboree's radio station is a hub of energy and excitement.

"We need to give 100% in order to hype the Scouts up," Kat said, describing the radio's vital role in maintaining enthusiasm throughout the camp. Tom, Kat and Kai sat down to talk about the happenings of JNNFM, touching on some of the key points to a successful broadcast. A presenter's routine relies on "shaking off what happened yesterday," Kai stated, as well as the success of the broadcasting team. What is heard on radio is only a portion of the entire process. The presenters insist on the importance of teamwork, consisting of announcers, producers and integration. Forfeiting credit, they maintain that without the advice of producers, integration, and tech teams they would be "broadcasting out of a Bluetooth speaker".

All equipment used for the radio broadcasts is kindly supplied by Nova 96.9. Eclipse Sound and Lighting provides the strobes and booming speakers so enjoyed by all of you at the Scout disco. Black Magic Camera Gear also chipped in the recording equipment to allow the radio to gain a true sense of what's on a Scouts mind during the Jamboree.

Music is played under a community license. This guarantees access to a large majority of songs, meaning all of your requests can be played throughout the Jamboree. In the meantime, songs are selected from a compilation of tunes from top 100 lists and classics. This allows the radio to please all of their listeners around the campsite.

"I guess we've just figured out what we are doing," says Tom. JNNFM has developed mostly in its professional approach towards production and broadcasting. The presenters of the 9 @ 9 program maintain that the best part

Going the Distance at Endurance

The Scouts were out enjoying the sunshine at Endurance, completing at least 10 of the 18 awesome activities available over the 10km trail. There was a broad range of activities that all required the Scouts to work together, use their problem solving skills and their physical ability to complete the stunts successfully. Scouts competed in giant board games like battleship, operation and connect four, built and climbed milk crate towers, and used giant sling shots to dunk Troop members into water tanks.

The activities were challenging and required all Scouts to give each stunt a shot. Will Chadwick (C411) said he loved that all the activities were "slightly challenging and got you to work as a Patrol. They were fun." The crate stacking was particularly difficult, requiring good balance, coordination and communication between Patrol members, something Matthew Wilson-Bronson and Aiden Szep (C435) did particularly well, with Aidan managing to stay well balanced on a very tall stack while Matt built the tower and gave Aiden clear and helpful instructions from the ground. For some, the biggest challenge was facing their fears, by climbing to the top of the climbing wall, for others it was the long walk and muddy terrain, but for Sam Coad (D725) it was getting out of his cozy bed that morning.

The two favourite activities of the day were skirmish and bubble soccer. In skirmish, Scouts were split into teams and tagged others out by shooting them with water pistols full of green dyed water. This left all the Scouts a lovely shade of green and caused an abundance of Shrek quotes and jokes including "get out of my swamp!" and "do you have layers (like an onion)?" Bubble soccer, on the other hand, had kids dressed up in inflatable bubbles and "smashing into people". The kids all had a ball!
