International Night saw nine different countries come together to produce a world-wide show for all to enjoy.

The night started off with a bang with the Tonga Contingent dancing an energetic and fun piece. The three-part dance was a celebration of culture, with yells echoing loud enough to be heard back in Tonga. Two of the dancers, Seini and Mele of C776, said they were "extremely proud to be representatives of Tonga and its great culture".

Beginning with a welcoming from their Leader, the Fijians opened with their national anthem, followed by an invitation to the crowd to sing out the Scout Promise. They then progressed to an easy to follow dance which the whole crowd joined in.

The third performance began with the eager waving of the Kiribati flag by the younger of the two Scouts. They progressed into a unison song and dance. Proud of their performance, the Micronesians exited the stage in laughter.

The Indonesian Scouts began their performance with a traditional dance telling a story of a King and a Lion - representing the journey of life and followed with a marching flag dance performed with military precision.

The Korean "Arirang" dance, representing the unity of their nation, included the use of pink fans. Billy from A665 was "mesmerised by all the colours of the outfits and the fans." The Koreans then performed a dance from BTS which

got the crowd excited and wanting more.

Flooding the stage, the Kiwis opened with their national anthem in Maori. Strength and pride were shown throughout the performance from the beginning to the Haka, in which everyone on stage participated.

Running on with their drums and traditional gowns, the Bangladeshis had a multiple part performance with several music and outfit changes. Their performance then concluded with the waving of multiple Bangladesh flags showcasing the country's pride. The following Timorese performance also featured flags, ending with simple dance moves from partnered Scouts.

The British flooded the stage as their leader greeted the crowd with the opening to a "Bob the Builder" classic: "Big Fish, Little Fish, Cardboard Box." Gaby of D648 "really enjoyed seeing the enthusiasm of the whole crowd and the fellow Scouts on stage" and said "I couldn't be happier that we used such a classic."

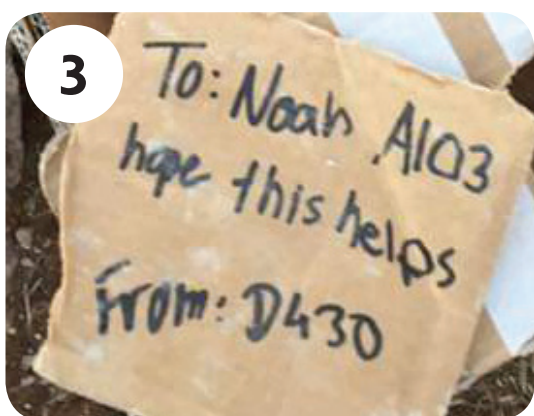

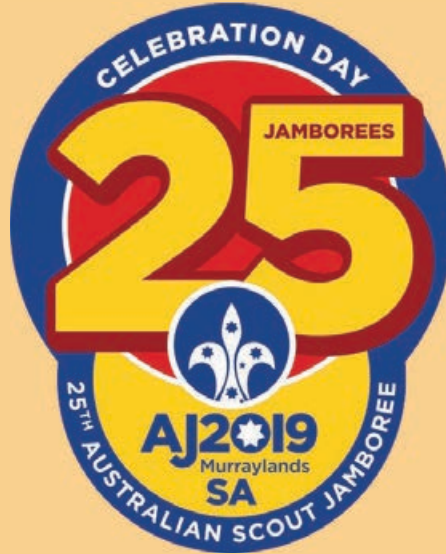
Rules for a great market day:

Australia has had Sea Scouts and Air Scouts for a long time, Groups with a different program emphasis but with the same uniform and award scheme. But Sri Lanka has three distinct types of Scout Group – Land Scouts, Sea Scouts, and Air Scouts.

Udara from Sri Lanka, who is working at AJ2019 as a Venturer, dropped by with his friend Hansith, a Land Scout, to explain.

All three branches of Scouting follow the same award scheme and program, but also have special features. Air Scouts must complete the Airman Badge, Land Scouts must complete the Bushman Stone, and Sea Scouts must complete the Seaman Badge.

Land Scouts are the most popular in Sri Lanka, making up around 80% of Sri Lankan Scouts. Of the remaining Scouts, most are Air Scouts, with 1500 Air Scouts in Sri Lanka.

Air Scouts cooperate with the Sri Lankan Air Force, and learn about many aircraft related things, including practising flying with a simulator.

The three types of Scouts can be told apart by their uniform.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In a controversial move which has raised diplomatic issues for the Jamboree Executive Committee, Troop C545 have declared themselves a sovereign nation. They have already drafted an initial constitution with basic laws relating to civil discipline and regulations and have already begun to establish diplomatic relationships.

Speaker of the General Assembly and Head of State, Dominic, has acquired the power to marry consenting couples but only within the boundaries of C545's campsite. "We realised that we couldn't marry two kids under Australian law", said Nixon, Head of Military "And it kind of escalated from there."

"Citizenship is available at the nations boundary of C545," informed Dominic. "The Daily Bunyip" is unable to verify which nations will be accepting C545 passports as travel documents.

Asked about how the nation will survive when AJ2019 concludes on January 13, the interim government advised that they intend to become a virtual nation with a presence online.

Not all Leaders are like this, but there is a select few who aren't getting their eight hours a day.

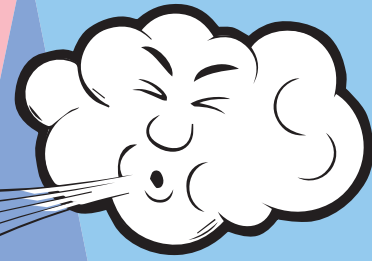
So, if you're feeling annoyed by a Venturer, a Rover or a dog, go and have a nap.

Venturers, Rovers and Leaders are all here for the same reason: to support the Scouts. We should be treated the same way. Respect is two-way street.



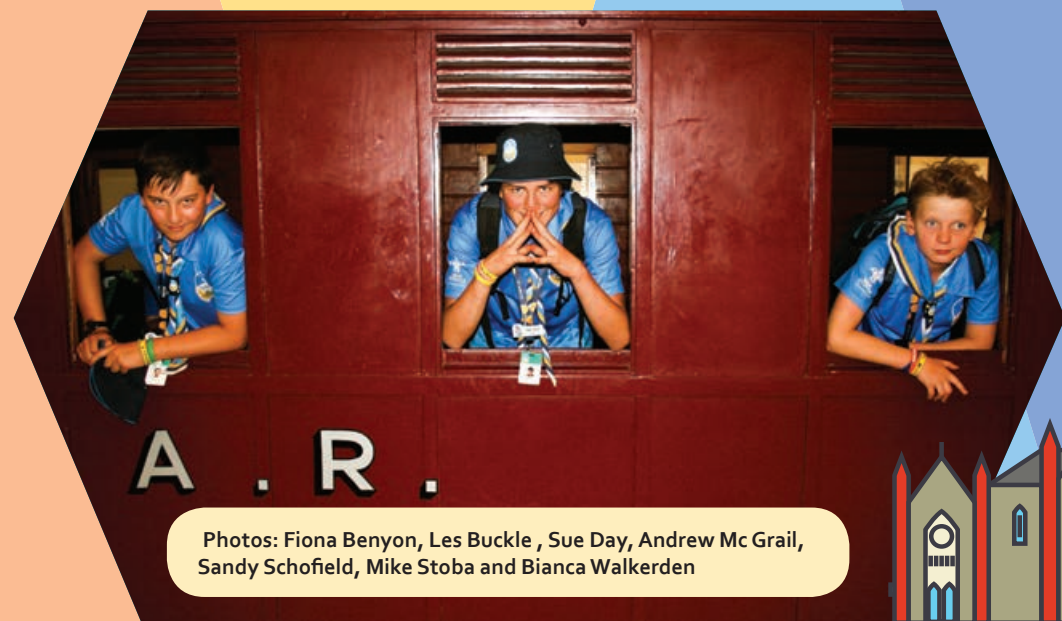
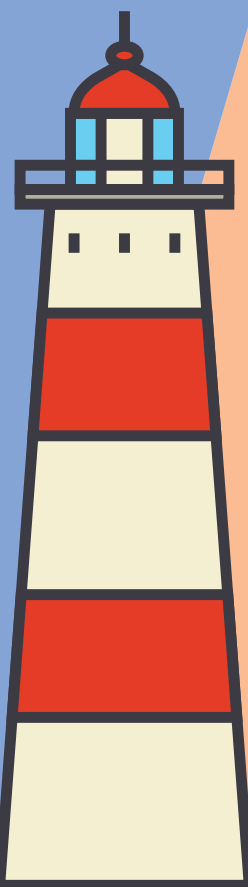
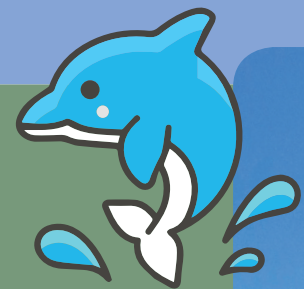

INTERNATIONAL HUB

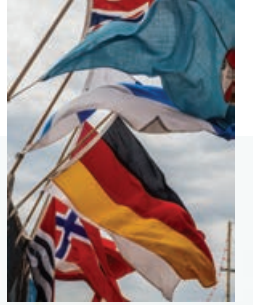

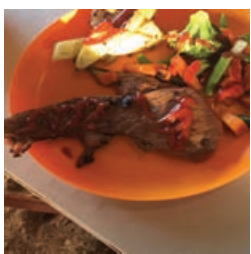
